**Dear Stuart** 

I am writing to you requesting that CMI consider the Association of Average Adjusters for Consultative Membership status.

The Association of Average Adjusters came in to existence in the UK is 1869. Initially the intention was to arbitrate on disputed claims but this soon became "The promotion of correct principals in the adjustment of Averages and uniformity of practice amongst Average Adjusters and the maintenance of good professional conduct". Over the last nearly 150 years, the aims of the Association have changed little and they currently are the promotion of professional standards and correct principles in the adjustment of marine insurance claims and general average, including by:

- ensuring, through examination or otherwise, that those becoming a Fellow or an Associate Member possess the requisite level of expertise;
- providing a forum for discussion and by establishing rules of practice where necessary in order to achieve uniformity of practice amongst Average Adjusters;
- imposing a strict code of professional conduct in order to ensure the independence and impartiality of its Fellows;
- establishing procedures by which advice on all aspects of marine claims may be obtained;
- promoting marine insurance education amongst members of the maritime insurance

Over its history, the Association's Chairpersons have included a number of prominent Law Lords in addition to senior adjusters of the day.
